For 45 years, BBBS of SWLA has operated under the belief that inherent in every young person is the ability to succeed and thrive in life. All they need is a positive relationship to help them find the potential that is already inside them. Our dedicated program staff make meaningful professionally supported relationships between adult volunteers ("Bigs") and youth ("Littles"), ages 6 through 18 who reside in Allen, Beauregard, Calcasieu, Cameron, Jeff Davis, and Vernon Parishes.

Throughout our history, we have heard from many of our volunteers and families on the importance of our mentoring programs and how it enriches their lives. We currently have mentors in our program that were once Littles themselves. We have former Littles that work with our agency to help other kids have that same life changing experience. Every year, we celebrate our Littles as they graduate from high school and go on to adulthood. We watch as our Littles grow up and become amazing, contributing members of our community. As of today, we have 90 youth on our wait list and 25 volunteers on our wait list. It is critical that our community step up and become a Big. Please help us with engaging volunteers in the community. Our youth need YOU.

2023 was an exciting year of rebirth, regrowth, and recomittment to our Vision and Mission. The successes we celebrated last year would not be possible without each of YOU, our community stakeholders. We feel very fortunate to have a diverse, generous, and dedicated community supporting the families and youth in our mentoring programs. Opening our satellite office in Beauregard Parish has enabled us to reach more youth in rural and undeserved areas. I am proud to inform you that we have matched 30 youth with a Big in Beauregard & Vernon Parishes, launched Operation Big for youth who live at Fort Johnson/JRTC, in partnership with the BOSS and MWR Programs. Launched Big Futures in Elton's middle school, in partnership with the Coushatta Tribe of Louisiana to ensure Tribal youth are receiving critical life skills and behavioral support in their school. And provided school-to-work opportunities and important life and financial literacy skills to MentorU youth ages 12-17, a program that is creating a pathway of opportunity to teens when they need it the most.

On behalf of our Board of Directors, staff, volunteers, Littles, and Parent/Guardians, we thank you for all you have done and will continue to do to support our Vision that all youth achieve their full potential. With your help, BBBS of SWLA will continue to make and maintain meaningful, carefully screened mentor relationships for the youth most in need.

OUR VISION

Youth Mentoring Programs SITE-BASED MENTORING

Where Bigs (Mentors) have availability limitations, or children specifically desire school help, this structure allows Mentors and the children we serve to meet at school during the school day.

COMMUNITY-BASED MENTORING

Allows the Big (Mentor) and the children to meet at their convenience, typically on weekends or after school for fun activities.



MENTORU

Youth ages 12-18 meet monthly in a curriculum-based non-1-1 or 1-1 group mentoring program that provides learning in career planning, life skills, financial literacy, better decision making, and behavioral health.

BIGS WITH BADGES

Local first responders serve as mentors in the communities where they serve in either the site-based or community-based mentoring programs.

BIG FUTURES

A hybrid program of high school students matched with middle school students OR non-1-1 group mentoring to Middle School Students that provides site-facilitated, curriculum based programming for high school readiness, career exploration, school-to-work and other life skills.

BIG FUTURES SUMMER MENTORING ACADEMY


A week-long academy for youth in grades 7th-9th focused on career exploration, school-to-work opportunities, life skills, and financial literacy.


OPERATION BIG

LITTLE FUTURES SUMMER MENTORING ACADEMY


A three-week academy for youth in grads 3rd-6th focused on life skills, physical fitness, literacy, and educational field trips.


